## UV exposure and heat illness guide - Smartplay

## New National Alliance formed to reduce harm from alcohol

A new national coalition of health and community organisations from across Australia was announced today to reduce alcohol-related harm.

Comprising an initial 26 major organisations with a focus on public health and alcohol, the National Alliance for Action on Alcohol (NAAA) will focus on reducing alcohol problems in the community.

One in five Australians aged 14+ years drink at short-term risky/high-risk levels at least once a month. This equates to more than 42 million occasions of risky or high-risk drinking in Australia each year.

The cost to the Australian community from alcohol-related harm in 2004/05 was estimated to be more than \$15 billion, including \$3.5 billion in lost productivity in the workplace.

An estimated 70 per cent of all police actions on the streets involve alcohol abuse, whether dealing with victims, perpetrators or witnesses to alcohol crime.

On average, one in four hospitalisations of young people aged 15 – 24 occur because of alcohol. Alcohol consumption at a young age can also adversely affect brain development and is linked to alcohol-related problems later in life.

A recent survey of Australians revealed that 84 per cent of people are concerned about the impact of alcohol on the community.

“The majority of Australians say we have a national drinking problem and want to see more action to prevent alcohol-related illness, injury and death,” said Professor Mike Daube, Chair of the NAAA and President of the Public Health Association of Australia.

Todd Harper, CEO of the Victorian Health Promotion Foundation (VicHealth) and NAAA co-convenor said: “This is the first time such a broad group of health organisations has come together to pool their collective expertise around what needs to be done to address Australia’s drinking problems.”

David Templeman, CEO of the Australian Alcohol and Other Drugs Council (ADCA) said: “We all want to see a much stronger emphasis on action. We will now be inviting all organisations genuinely concerned to reduce alcohol problems in Australia to join the Alliance so we can ensure real action.”

John Rogerson, CEO of the Australian Drug Foundation said: “The adverse effects of alcohol impact on everybody in the community. We’ll be sending a clear message to Government and all politicians that there is a pressing need for action, and we’ll be putting forward evidence- based solutions around these issues.”

Initial priorities for the NAAA will be:

- reforming alcohol taxation
- buying-out by government of alcohol sponsorship in sports and the arts
- increasing investment in prevention
- strengthening the regulating of alcohol advertising
- introducing health information labelling on alcohol products and including point-of-sale promotions

## ACCC decides restrictive ice hockey policy is anti competitive

The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission has issued a notice revoking Ice Hockey Australia's notification, under which its members are prevented from playing in ice hockey competitions that have not been approved by Ice Hockey Australia.

Ice Hockey Australia proposed to suspend or expel any member who participated in a non-sanctioned Australian or international ice hockey game. The policy applies to all players and officials, including referees and coaches.

"The ACCC is concerned that the notified conduct has the effect, or is likely to have the effect, of substantially lessening competition by creating barriers to entry for new ice hockey leagues and making it difficult for existing leagues to remain competitively viable," ACCC chairman Graeme Samuel, said.

"It also harms players and officials by limiting their ability to participate in ice hockey competitions of their choosing. "IHA's submission to the ACCC set out concerns in relation to potential loss of its International Ice Hockey Federation membership in circumstances where its ability to control ice hockey in Australia is affected.

"In issuing the notice, the ACCC is of the view, however, that its decision does not affect IHA's ability to effectively administer the sport of ice hockey at the national level and operate as the governing body for the sport in Australia."

This notice removes the protection from legal action that is afforded by the notification. If no application for review of the notice is made to the Australian Competition Tribunal, this legal protection ceases to be in force on 2 April 2010.

Businesses may obtain protection in relation to conduct that might be at risk of breaching the exclusive dealing provisions of the *Trade Practices Act 1974* by lodging a notification with the ACCC. Once lodged, protection for the notified conduct begins automatically, or in the case of third line forcing, after 14 days.

The ACCC may revoke a notification (other than third line forcing) if it is satisfied that the conduct has the purpose, effect or likely effect of substantially lessening competition and that it does not deliver a net public benefit. Before issuing a revocation notice, the ACCC must issue a draft notice setting out its reasons for proposing to revoke the notification.

Gridiron Australia, the governing body of American Football (Gridiron) has selected Melbourne to host the 2010 Senior National Championship Tournament, to be held at the State Netball/Hockey Centre in Parkville on April 10-16, 2010. This will be the first time Melbourne has hosted the event.

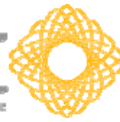
